

Harvest season is in full swing, and with it comes specific safety precautions. The following safety tips apply year-round but are especially important this time of year.

 Look up, look out and look around.
 Be aware of overhead power lines at all times. If you must move equipment under a line, have someone watching to ensure an electrical contact doesn't occur.

- Don't stack hay or round bales near electrical lines to avoid electrical contact with hay loaders or other moving equipment.
- Always lower grain augers when moving from bin to bin.
- Be aware of the location of guy wires and anchors on overhead power lines.

 When moving farm equipment, know the loaded height so contact isn't made with overhead power lines on roads and around field entrances.

Regardless of the time of year, never approach a downed power line. Always assume it's energized and notify OPPD immediately or call 911.

## A life-saving tool for rural OPPD workers



OPPD field employees who work alone in rural areas have a new life-saving safety tool at their disposal when they're up in a bucket truck.

Line crews, street lighters, troubleshooters and automation technicians recently received self-rescue kits that they can use to lower themselves from buckets in an emergency.

The kits add another layer of protection for workers who find themselves stranded high in the air during service work.

OPPD field work-

ers endure all kinds of weather, including

severe winter storms and frigid temperatures. Getting stuck in a bucket could become dangerous in those conditions.

The kits consist of a rope, straps, rappelling device and locking carabiners, all stored in an insulated bag. One carabiner attaches to a sturdy metal rail on the bucket as an anchor point. Users connect themselves to the rope with a different locking carabiner that hooks onto their work harnesses. They can then lower themselves safely to the ground.

OPPD's service territory covers 5,000 square miles, stretching from rural Burt County to the north all the way south to the Kansas border.



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
